

# Editorial

We are proud to present the fourth edition of EDPL for 2024.

In the articles section, we have three contributions. Sophia Salziger homes in on Article 82 GDPR in light of Artificial Intelligence, Martin Erlebach as well sheds light on Artificial Intelligence as a lens to discuss privacy issues with data training, and finally, Rowin Jansen and Pieter Wolters analyse in detail the transfer of personal data between the EU and US, in particular in light of the access to data by American intelligence agencies.

The reports section led by Mark Cole and Christina Etteldorf contains two country reports, one written by Thomas Dubuisson on the Belgian DPA's approach to the tension between data training and use of AI and data protection, the other by Christina Etteldorf, discussing a German's court's judgement on data scraping. In addition, Sandra Schmitz-Berndt discusses in detail the EDPB's guidance on new tracking techniques.

The case note section, led by Maria Tzanou, contains two case notes on recent judgments by the CJEU. Robin Vandendriessche and Kevin Lela discuss a case that could be seen as the follow up to the *Meta Platforms v Bundeskartellamt* case, and Pedro Peziz Viana a judgment on the admissibility of the use of communications data for law enforcement purposes.

Finally, in the book review section led by Gloria Gonzalez Fuster, Shweta Reddy Degalahal assesses the recent book by Damian Clifford on human emotions and its reflection in data protection law.
